BUILDING YOUR COMMUNICATIONS TEAM

Communication

Church communications is more than just editing the newsletter or making an announcement on Sunday morning. The everchanging complexities of modern communications require skills in a variety of interest fields.

Your church staff can't do everything. There are areas that escape their vision. That is where your church communications team comes in.

It takes a dedicated team to organize your church's various communications. A unified, consistent, and intentional communication strategy begins with your church's mission.

Whether you're currently building your team or you already have one, a team from a variety of backgrounds, ages, and genders increases the effectiveness of your overall church communication strategy. Every team will look different and might include paid staff, volunteers, contractors, interns, or some combination thereof.

If you have resources or means to hire someone, then great, but there are ways of working around this through volunteers and asking for help. If your church is fortunate enough to have staff, make sure you don't lock out volunteers. Whether you're recruiting staff or volunteers, intentionality is still important.

While one individual may not be able to take on all of these roles, some team members may fall in more than one role.

Communications Team Roles:

Project manager— coordinates between ministry leaders, creative staff, vendors, and volunteers.

Brand manager— checks for continuity and consistency in colors, fonts, and logo usage.

Copywriter— an excellent writer who understands the power of personal stories.

Graphic designer— creates compelling graphics to support the messages and promotions of the church.

Photographer— someone who knows how to tell a story with photographs.

Videographer— someone who knows how to tell a story with video.

Social media guru— coordinates and manages social media promotions and pages.

The Cheerleader— an outgoing, polished speaker who buys into your mission and wants every task to succeed in that mission.

The Outsider— helps generate messages that appeal to the whole community.

The Listener— understands how important listening is and also has the magic touch for recruiting volunteers.

Final Recommendation? Start simple, start somewhere, and work with what you have.

THOUGHTS FROM YOUR REGIONAL MINISTER

October is designated as Pastor appreciation month – a time when we encourage congregations to say thank you to their pastors. More than any other year, I believe it is important to say thank you to pastors of congregations in some tangible way.

You may not realize this, but many pastors have been hard at work learning to do ministry in ways they have neither been trained for or thought they would be doing. This pandemic has forced us to adopt the use of technology

in ways many are not use to. It has forced us to put together on-line worship without a live audience, thus taking on a role more like a television program producer/director/performer, than a pastor.

It has forced the use of video conferencing technology for meetings and educational experiences that has changed the nature of those experiences. It has meant longer hours and learning how to nurture professional and pastoral relationships without the benefit of being in the physical presence of others. And it has raised the stress level of us all, but especially pastors as they deal frequently with feelings of inadequacy for doing ministry in these ways.

Most pastors, have taken on this challenge with a dedication and faithfulness that I admire and I'm grateful for. They have done so with little complaining and they have done so because they love God and their congregations. They want what is best for those whom God has given into their care.

So, please, I encourage you, send your pastor a card of thanks or encouragement this month. (See article on page 4 for additional ways to show appreciation) But most of all give them an extra measure of grace and forgiveness. You will be glad you did and so will they.

TAWAKONI CAMP UPDATE

The Camp Steering Committee is working to analyze and prepare a list of future maintenance needs. The list currently includes two items in the kitchen to meet current health code requirements and replacing air conditioning condenser units. In addition, we are investigating a security system including a new front gate which can be easily monitored by staff.

The camp is blessed by many who care deeply for the Disciples Center. We have quite a list of return-users, including quilt groups, young adults from local colleges, and others. The pandemic forced many of our regularly scheduled camp programs and non-program group rentals to cancel for 2020. We have received about \$28,000 in program fees of the budgeted \$173,000 and about \$800 in non-program rental fees of the budgeted \$12,100. We have heard from



several of these, hoping for dates in 2021.

In addition, we have a wonderful list of volunteers who help to keep everything working. Some are available for mowing, and others tackle projects which need careful work. These folks are such a blessing, and the door is open to invite others.

Develop effective church communication strategies and goals to become a better steward of your church’s communication resources at the 2021 Art of Church Communication workshops.

OCTOBER IS PASTOR APPRECIATION MONTH

On average, 90% of pastors work over 45 hours a week, but this year hasn't been normal. A recent study shows that, pastors have increased their workload to 55-70 hours per week. (See accompanying article "Thoughts from your Regional Minister" on page 2)

October is designated as Pastor Appreciation Month with a mission of uplifting and encouraging pastors, missionaries and religious workers. Throughout October, take the opportunity to show your gratitude for the hard work your pastor does. Here are a few ideas:

Give a special church donation: Charitable giving has dropped, and these gifts are vital to your church's mission. Give a special gift in your pastor's name. Then, write a note expressing how the pastor has positively influenced your relationship with God.

Activate others to donate: Inviting a friend, neighbor, co-worker, and others to donate to your church's mission causes is a wonderful way to show your pastor you value them.

Engage to the fullest: Engage with your church beyond the walls by downloading your church app, watching your live stream, participating in prayer requests, and sharing social media posts.

Give a monetary gift: Monetary gifts are thoughtful, and there are a variety of ways to present these. Cash trees are easy and fun to give. You can also give gift cards to the pastor's favorite restaurant, bookstore, or grocery stores.

Update technology for the church: Technology can make a pastor's job much easier. Collect funds to update and replace

old computers, dated church management systems, and sound systems.

Medical/Food supplies for ministry: Right now, ministers are out in their communities helping people that are suffering. Depending on your church's current mission efforts, they could use extra supplies. Call your church and ask what items are needed most.

Volunteer: Volunteer in your pastor's name to help fill a need such as extra cleaning duties, community outreach programs, and other leadership responsibilities.

A final thought: Remember, if you don't know what your pastor would appreciate most, ask office assistants, close friends or family members. Trust that no matter what you give as a token of appreciation, your pastor will love and cherish it.

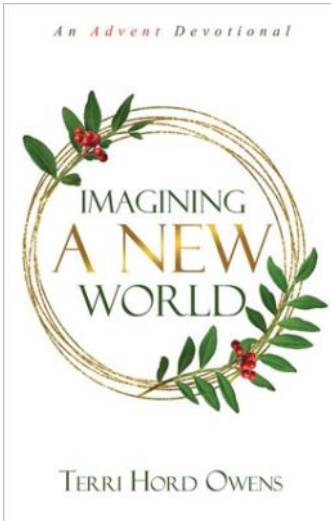

AN INVITATION TO ‘WATER THE PLANTS’

The challenges of starting a church are unique. “Water the Plants” is a church-wide initiative from New Church Ministry that brings together 1,000 intercessors to pray for new leaders and congregations in the Christian Church (DOC).

This program gathers a team of dedicated supporters of new worship expressions to prioritize the spiritual discipline of prayer. Based on 1 Corinthians 3:6, we take a proactive approach to “watering” church “plants” with prayer.

If you are interested in participating, we ask that you commit to praying for the ministries and leaders of the New Church Movement. You will receive a prayer calendar that will guide daily and weekly prayers during your own personal prayer times as well as during our group prayer times led by a New Church Ministry Prayer Leader. In addition, you will receive regular communication prayer reminders as well as a physical prayer reminder of your choice. As part of their Covenant Agreement, intercessors are expected to:

- Embrace a lifestyle of prayer
- Regularly join a Water the Plants Prayer Group by phone for an 11-minute prayer led by a Prayer Leader
- Receive regular communication regarding additional prayer topics by email, text, and/or social media
- Provide your mailing address to receive keychain or wristband — your choice — that will remind you to pray.
